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Dear People Whom God Loves,

Beliefs—Valuable, but with a Dark Side

Let's address the first question about survival as a people. The Jewish people were in the small Persian province of Yehud. Jerusalem was in Yehud. They were surrounded by powerful empires that could destroy them. How would they survive? They had to form a very tight relationship with one another to have any hope of survival. This would understandably create a human survival mode.

Answering the second question of why they were not protected by God also gave them the answer of how to have that protection in the future. The reason that they came up with was that they were not protected by God because they had not been faithful. They had not followed faithfully the law of Moses. It was their fault, not God's, that God didn't protect them. "I will be your God and you will be my people." They had not behaved as God's people.

Following the prescriptions of the law in every detail would bring about this survival as a people. Their nation was at stake. This can give us some understanding of the Pharisees. The Pharisees (who followed the law very strictly) separated themselves from the ones who didn't follow the law the way they did. They at least were the ones, they thought, who would preserve the nation by total dedication to the law of Moses.

This brings us to Saul (the strictest of Pharisees) and his belief that enables us to understand his persecution of the followers of Jesus.

The early followers of Jesus were all Jews. As Jews, they understood the value of the law of Moses and they continued to observe it. As their understanding of Jesus grew, they began to doubt (at least some of them did) that following all of the prescriptions were necessary. They also began to wonder if the God they knew through Jesus was exactly like the God who demanded such strict observance as a condition of protection.

What then would be in the mind of Saul who was passionate about the importance

of strict adherence to the law? He apparently saw these Jewish followers of Jesus as a danger to the survival of the Jewish people. The cleanliness and purity that came from following the law of Moses was endangered. Therefore, to eliminate these people was a duty before God. It even led to killing. As Stephen, a follower of Jesus, was being stoned to death, the witnesses laid their cloaks at the feet of the young man named Saul. When we look at the big picture, Saul was not a bad man, but his religious belief led to persecution and killing.

Centering Prayer meets via Zoom on Thursday Evenings at 7pm -8pm. In Centering

Prayer, the participant seeks the presence of God directly. The participant's aim is to be present to the Lord, to "consent to God's presence and action during the time of prayer." Thomas Keating emphasizes that Centering Prayer is not an exercise in concentrating or focusing one's attention on something (such as a mantra), but rather is concerned with Intention and Consent. Fr. M. Basil Pennington suggests these steps for practicing Centering Prayer:

Sit comfortably with your eyes closed, relax, and quiet yourself.

- Choose a sacred word that best supports your sincere intention to be in the lord's presence and open to His divine action within you.
- Let that word be gently present as your symbol of your sincere intention to be in the Lord's presence and open to His divine action within you.
- Whenever you become aware of anything (thoughts, feelings, perceptions, images, associations, etc.) simply return to your sacred word--your anchor.

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Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation by prayer and petition, with THANKSGIVING present your requests to GOD and the peace of GOD, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in CHRIST JESUS . Philippians 4:6-7
