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Dear People Whom God Loves,

Christ

I Corinthians 15:22 "For just as in Adam all die, so too in Christ shall all be brought to life." What I see is that our union with Christ who lives in us brings us to eternal life. We are gradually transformed until we are drawn into the state of complete love and peace. This is the state that we have named heaven.

Matthew 25:40 "And the king will say to them in reply, 'Amen I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did it for me.' " Since Christ lives in each one of us, whatever we do to each other or to ourselves, we do it to Christ.

Romans 16:25 "Now to him who can strengthen you, according to my gospel and the proclamation of Jesus Christ, according to the revelation of the mystery kept for long ages."

Note in the New Amsterdam Bible: "Paul's gospel reveals the mystery kept secret for long ages; justification and salvation through faith, with all the implication for Jews and Gentiles that Paul has developed in the letter." My Note: The LOVE we name GOD has been active in our universe since the Big Bang.

It helps me to image God not as an entity or a being, not even a supreme being, but as real and active love.

We might think of God as loving energy—more subtle than physical energy. There is physicality in us beings, and we are able to cause something to happen. Since God is love, there is no physicality in God. Also, there was nothing for God to work with. This means that the way God works is different from the way beings work.

We are not able to compare with God's working in our world and the universe with the way we work. This helps me with questions such as, "Why doesn't God stop wars and other bad things from happening?" Since we can't compare God's working in creation with the way we work, God's working will always be mysterious and beyond our control.

Why pray? First of all, I see prayer as being willing to be open to have God change us—not our trying to change God. Secondly, I see prayer as fostering an openness that provides the space for God (LOVE) to work in a way that does not interfere with our freedom and the freedom of the rest of the universe.

To put it another way, the power of love is not the same as the power of force. Fortunately, we can be open to God's working. This happens when in prayer we are willing, at least to some degree, for God to work in God's way rather than our way. This often means that we will be drawn into deeper love and compassion. I also believe that God, without taking away our freedom, helps us to be willing.

Prayer can transform us. This transformation can come when in prayer or otherwise we are open and willing, at least to some degree, for LOVE (God) to transform us in whatever way LOVE (God) sees is good. My experience is that what is good in the big picture is often not what I want or what I see as good. I can only trust.

This transformation can come from our participation in the sacraments. The loving divine presence is there. Our part is to be willing to allow that presence to transform us.

YEAR OF ST. JOSEPH BEGINNING DECEMBER 8, 2020

As Archbishop Hebda announced in his October 22 column for The Catholic Spirit, the Archdiocese will be observing a Year of Saint Joseph, beginning December 8, 2020 (Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, patroness of America). Archbishop Hebda wrote, "On that date, the Church Universal will be marking the 150th anniversary of Pope Pius IX's proclamation of Saint Joseph as the Patron of the Universal Church. Our hope is that the Year of Saint Joseph will be a source of renewal in our local Church, most especially as we continue our preparations for the Synod of 2022."
